This is what I've experienced with the New Firenocks. First of all let me say, I don't intentionally try to destroy my stuff, but as bowhunters know "Stuff happens". They were very straight forward and easy to assemble. having bigger hands, I did have to have the assistance of my hemostats(you know those clicking fishing pliers)

I was able to install them in my traditional arrows with no modification of the arrow at all, just remove the old nock and insert the new one, very easy.

For those people that haven't seen or used Firenocks they are turned on by a magnet, nothing more, nothing less.

With the new nocks I headed for the woods. it was a cloudy day but what fun I did have. the newer nocks are just as bright, if not brighter than the previous firenocks.

I did experience a jumping tree, it leaped right in the way of a intended mound of grass. the broadhead is still in the tree but I was able to recover the rest of the arrow and still working firenock. for dusk shots, cloudy days they are the greatest thing.

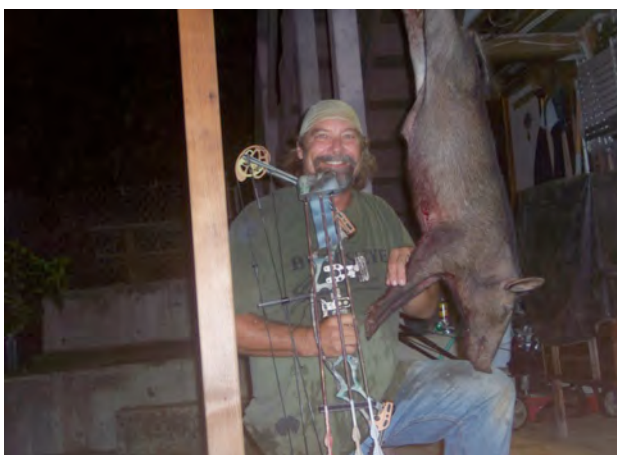
I don't know how well most people see in the woods but, I'm happy for all the help I can get.

I shot a few times just to see if there was any flight difference before I headed to the blind. there wasn't any difference that I could tell.(minus the stupid tree)

Once again the firenock proved it's worth, it showed me I didn't make as good of shot at I wanted. right at peak dusk is a hard time to tell exactly where the arrow hit with a regular wrapped/dipped arrow with a bright color nock on it.

I was able to see the hog run thru the woods and watched the firenocked arrow come out of the hog. I was able to cut 30-40 yards off of my blood trail just because I could see the bright red glow. So I started from there not where the shot happened.

The arrow was inside the body for sometime the fletching and nock was completely blood covered, no malfunctions because of blood or liquid it fit that tight. (they even used them in salt water, and he was worried bout me abusing them:wink:)



With a short and heavy blood trail (I still have no clue what I hit to cause so much blood) my job was much easier and time was a lot shorter in the woods.

I will always have a firenock on my hunting arrows, they are just that good.

Even for tuning broadheads, watching the firenock tells you exactly what the arrow is doing, great tuning aid.

You might remember, I was somewhat dismayed by the cost of 3 firenocks? They have proved their worth.

You'll see in my hog pics, 3 firenocks in my quiver. they will always be there. Now that they fit my trad arrows? I'm a happy camper.
